



Conferences are approaching, so please be on the look out for conference sign ups.





We are so excited that we will be studying Egypt for International day! What is International Day and When is it?

Why do we celebrate International day?

Maria Montessori believed that children should gain a world view at an early age. Children begin to realize that they are part of a bigger community. Maria Montessori's goal was to promote global understanding and international peace.

This understanding begins through the geography and cultural lessons. The children become aware of where they live in the world, and then begin learning to identify the continents and many countries. Their world begins to expand. Montessori cultural lessons expose children to different people and their cultures. We want to create an atmosphere where we embrace and celebrate the many different cultures around the world.


Maria Montessori once wrote that "The child is both the hope and a promise for mankind."

How do we incorporate our cultural studies throughout the week?

During line time, Ms. Christina and I present a lesson to the class about Egypt. We read books, make slide shows, show pictures, and watch short educational videos about our subject. We also make 3-part cultural cards about food, animals, culture, and ancient Egypt. We add these materials to our cultural shelves and the children can practice these lessons throughout the morning work cycle.

After lunchtime, we have been reading chapter books out loud that pertain to Egypt. We recently just finished the Magic Treehouse book Mummies in the Morning and will be reading Seasons of the Sandstorm next! During lunchtime, we have been listening to children's Arabic music! It is so fun to watch them sing along and dance to the music.




We all want to raise responsible children. And we all want to live in a world where others have been raised to be responsible, a world where adults don't shrug off their responsibilities as citizens. As my son said, surveying the littered park when he was three, "Don't grownups know they have to clean up their own messes?"

So how do we raise our kids to take responsibility for their choices and their impact on the world? You begin by seeing responsibility as something joyful for your child, instead of a burden. All children want to see themselves as response-able — powerful and able to respond to what needs to be done. They need this for their self esteem, and for their lives to have meaning. Children don't want just to be doted on. They need, like the rest of us, to feel like they matter to the world, like their lives make a positive contribution. So, you don't really need to teach kids to handle themselves responsibly in the world; you just need to teach them that they have the power to contribute positively, and to relate to them so that they want to do so. The bottom line is that kids will be responsible to the degree that we support them to be. Here are 15 everyday strategies guaranteed to increase your kids' "response-ability" quotient, plus a list of age-appropriate responsibilities.

Notice that these lists focus on your child's span of control, rather than on tasks you want them to do. There's a reason for that. When you focus on a list of tasks your child "should" do, you end up creating power struggles. "By now you should be able to clean up your own toys!" If, instead, you focus on helping your child take charge of his life, and support him as necessary to learn each new skill, your child wants to step into each new responsibility. Instead of your "holding him responsible," he becomes motivated to take responsibility for himself. It's a subtle shift, but it makes all the difference in the world.
