






#### What we have been learning...



#### **Upper Elementary News**

Thank you so much for your classroom visits and experiencing our Montessori curriculum! The students loved to have you in class to share their work as well as to hear from you about your career paths! They were very eager to ask many questions such as if you became what you dreamed of and how difficult it was to reach your goal.

We learned about the work of physical therapists, occupational therapists, geriatricians, medical doctors, diagnostic medical sonographers, fashion designers, civil lawyers, language instructors for non-native English speakers, restaurant business leaders, STEAM teachers, engineers, and marines. We were presented knowledge about entrepreneurship and jobs in special operations, telecommunication and in the wood and food industry.

During the presentation about work at the Emory Primate Research Center for example, our students were able to dive into the world of biomedical and behavioral researchers. They learned that the Emory Primate Research Center is one of only seven National Primate Research Centers and that it is part of a national network of dedicated teams fighting diseases from Alzheimer's to Zika.

Although still very young, our students may frequently be asked what they wanted to be when they grow up. While some of the children have dreams regarding their careers, many have not spent many thoughts about their future. Career days can help students as young as elementary school age start thinking more in depth about what they want to do as adults. It's a short step from elementary school to high school. When students start honing their skills and aspirations at an early age, their career path can transition from a bumpy road to an easy cruise.

We experienced firsthand that the career presentations gave students an up-close-and-personal view of an array of occupations, especially ones they have never heard of. These experiences can broaden their perspectives beyond classic, familiar jobs such as teacher or firefighter. The children also learn what skills and education are required for the industries and fields they have interest in and potential aptitude for. These experiences make children feel both validated and aware of having valuable gifts that they may share with their communities.

Thanks to the parents coming into the classroom, our students were given examples of the many ways that what they are learning in school can relate to educational and career opportunities in the future. They got especially excited when they realized that their own hobbies and goals could potentially be useful in the workforce later on.

What are additional benefits of presenting careers in the elementary classroom? Many young kids behave well in school and do what they are told because they want to live up to the expectations of the adults in their lives. We want them to see that the expectations we set should not solely be met because we said so. We want them to see the purposefulness of their learning.

By doing this at an early age, we get them thinking and keep them enchanted with learning and encourage the maintenance of a positive attitude towards their futures. Benefits of 'Career Cruising' not only include rising self-awareness but also increased respect for staff in the current workforce.
