Children in a Montessori classroom embrace celebrations of the seasons in a crosscurricular, more involved, and less obtrusive way. In the weeks prior to a holiday of importance, the Practical Life shelves may reflect the colors and symbols of the season in the pouring, sorting, or transferring works. The Language area and circle time activities will most certainly incorporate stories and songs related to the seasonal celebrations. Math works may use counting items that correlate with holiday themes. Art supplies change to stimulate the children's unique artistic expression using materials inspired by the time of year. And perhaps the best part of the classroom to share information about specific holidays is the Cultural area, where the children may find continent boxes filled with photographs, artifacts, and items associated with various holidays and the cultures from which they originated.

Dear Parents,

Children are naturally curious and learn about the world by exploring and interacting with their surroundings. One of the most powerful ways they gather information is through their senses—sight, sound, touch, taste, and smell. These sensory experiences help children make sense of their environment, form memories, and build foundational skills needed for cognitive, emotional, and physical development.

From the moment they are born, children begin using their senses to engage with the world. In fact, sensory experiences play a crucial role in early childhood development by supporting learning in ways that are engaging and meaningful. When children touch, hear, see, taste, or smell something, they are not just observing—it's an active process that shapes their understanding and connection to the world around them.

Why Sensory Learning Matters

- Brain Development: Engaging a child's senses stimulates the brain, fostering neural connections that are essential for problem-solving, creativity, language, and motor skills.
- Motor Skills: Sensory activities often involve handson exploration that supports both fine motor skills (like grasping, coloring, or writing) and gross motor skills (like running, jumping, or climbing).
- Language Development: As children encounter new sensory experiences, they expand their vocabulary and communication skills by learning words to describe what they see, hear, touch, taste, or smell.
- Emotional and Social Growth: Sensory play encourages children to express emotions, make decisions, and interact with others, promoting emotional regulation and social skills.

As children grow, sensory learning can help them understand complex concepts like cause and effect, categorization, and spatial relationships, while also allowing them to express their creativity, build confidence, and develop a love for learning. In short, learning through the senses is one of the most natural and effective ways children engage with their world, and it lays the groundwork for cognitive, emotional, and physical growth.

Ms. Maggie's & Ms. Robin's Class

A Montessori elementary cultural curriculum uses the Fundamental Needs of Humans to explore different cultures. The Fundamental Needs are often introduced by asking the children what is needed to survive as a society. This lesson sparks great interest in children because we can all relate to and identify our own personal and individual needs. Students are quick to recognize most of our shared material needs: food, shelter,

communication, transportation, and notice the needs for protection (defense), the arts, and our connections to one another.

Children learn to look at societies, past and present, through these lenses. It gives them truly useful examples of how people

organize their lives and use the tools, resources, and technology available to them to meet their needs. For example, children explore the history of houses over human history, or how they gathered, herded, or grew food. They look at art, music, dance, and design found around the world today and explore how they may have evolved over the centuries. Once this looking glass has been created, there are between nine and thirteen fundamental needs of humans. They can be used to notice similarities and differences in all societies, places, and times. This method of exploring different empires, countries, and even towns allows us to see that we all have the same fundamental needs, but over history, and even around the world today, they have been met in different ways. Exploring these needs through materials in the classroom, biographies, art, laws, clothing, architecture, speeches, and various other ways to explore history is encouraged in the elementary classroom, both acknowledging and appreciating differences and similarities. Montessori schools look at the world in search of similarities, differences, beauty, and consideration for all. In following the child and child development, Montessori teachers have always championed the beauty of all people and will continue to do so.



As Dr. Montessori reminded us in her 1937 address in Copenhagen, "An education capable of saving humanity is no small undertaking; it involves the spiritual development of man, the enhancement of his value as an individual, and the preparation of young people to understand the times in which they live." Using Fundamental Needs of Humans to explore history gives us a great tool to see that little white strip of humankind with greater understanding. It provides a helpful springboard for further research on various topics related to human well-being and development.

The Holiday season is here and for Montessori students, holidays offer plenty of opportunities for growth and celebration. Outside of classroom, holiday celebrations may be more prominent and there are ways to extend Montessori principles into holiday observations at home. Here are a few ideas to consider:

- Gift giving and receiving is a big part of Christmas, Hanukkah and other holiday celebrations. Use it as an opportunity
 to apply the Montessori principle of thoughtfulness. Get your child involved in selecting the gifts for others, from
 classmates and friends to family members. Talk about each person's likes, hobbies and preferences and discuss which gift
 would be best for them.
- In the true spirit of the season, teach your child kindness and generosity by finding ways to help others. Participating in a holiday toy drive, donating clothing or food to charity organizations, or engaging in volunteer activities are all great ways to express kindness.
- Create holiday rituals with your child. Rituals are very important for young children. They are likely to become those fond moments that your child will enjoy looking back on when he / she grows up. Think about the kind of rituals you would like to create with your family. Whether it's working on holiday crafts together, baking holiday cookies or going for an evening walk to see the festive lights, these memories are very strong and will probably last a lifetime.
- Cooking is one of the key practical life Montessori activities and the process of preparing meals offers multiple learning opportunities. Measuring and counting, for example, are great ways to begin to instill basic math lessons. Holiday foods are also colorful and can be used as a canvas for a child's creativity.

Whatever you do this holiday season, remember that it's the time to celebrate being together as a family. Enjoy each other's company and make some beautiful memories together.
