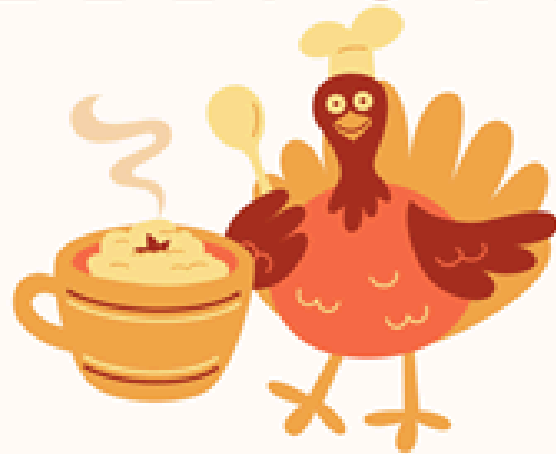

Ms. Ortrud's & Ms. Rana's Class

In our Montessori classroom cleaning is an important part of the curriculum. These activities help children develop independence, concentration, coordination, and respect for their environment.

Cleaning is part of Practical Life work, helping children build independence, coordination, and respect for their environment.

Daily Cleaning Activities:

- Table washing – scrub, rinse, dry
- Mirror washing – spray and wipe
- Sweeping and dusting – use child-sized tools
- Mopping and spill cleanup – care for accidents immediately
- Polishing – wood or metal
- Laundry and cloth folding – wash and care for classroom cloths

Each activity is child-sized, demonstrated slowly, and focused on the process, not perfection.

Beyond the practical life activities children take responsibility for caring for their classroom through daily end of day tasks like cleaning, organizing, and maintaining order. These activities foster independence, respect, and a sense of belonging. By caring for their environment, children learn that their actions have a meaningful impact on their community.



At the end of the day, children often help with:

- Watering and tidying plants
- Wiping tables and shelves
- Vacuuming and sweepings
- Folding and putting away cloths
- Returning all materials to order

These routines build community responsibility and pride in caring for their shared space.

Ms. Maggie's Class



October was a very busy month in our classroom. We began the month with our fourth Great Lesson: The Story of Language. We studied about how humans began communicating with one another and how it progressed into alphabets. We drew our own versions of cave men drawings. We deciphered a pictograph and wrote our own story of what we think happened in those pictures. We studied ancient alphabets and decoded words. We then began our fifth Great Lesson: The Story of Numbers. We learned about how ancient civilizations began using numbers and we even completed ancient math problems from the Babylonians, Sumerians, Egyptians, and Romans. We studied the history of the days of the week and months of the year.

The students did a great job with Historical Timeline. We worked on memorizing speeches, enunciating, and stage presence for the big event. After hearing my own personal timeline (they all said that I was the cutest baby of course), the students made their own timeline based on their character.

We also studied the different types of clouds. During the week of Halloween, we learned about our bones and we made skeletons. We also studied the brain and they labeled the different lobes with yarn. Lastly, we studied about the parts of the leaves and we classified different leaves based on their shape.

Thank you for all of your support this month! During the month of November, we will continue lessons on leaves, begin studying trees, fundamental needs, and dive more into geography. Thanksgiving will be here before we know it. Our Thanksgiving feast will be on Friday, November 21st. Thanksgiving break is November 24–28.

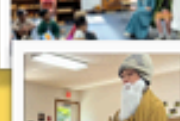
Importance of Public Speaking

We will be postponing our trip to Cherokee until January. Instead, we will take a day trip to the Funk Center at Reinhardt University.



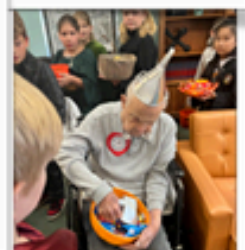
October Going Out Experience: Renaissance Marquis
