September is going to be a fun, busy month. We will be talking about transportation this month! We will scrub boats and learn about "sink and float" in our practical life area. Our class will spend a lot of time talking about the different ways we can get around with our language cards. We will sort different colors of cars in our sensorial area. We will also count the number of pieces it takes

I think it would be great to split up the job, so I'll be in touch with you to let you know how you can help.

The Upper Elementary has had a wonderful beginning this year! We have focused on team building and community during the first few weeks which has made our group swiftly become a tight-knit family of learners. Primary News from Ms. Dagmar and Ms. Emily

A glimpse at Ms. Dagmar and Ms. Emily's class:

It all began on August 13th, with a tea we held for the 3rd-year students. On the 14th, we welcomed children new to the school, and new to primary. On the 15th, everyone returned. Since that time, we've had two full weeks of instruction, and our welcome-back picnic. It's amazing what can be packed into two and a half weeks, isn't it? We've studied the sun, our planets, our galaxy, and the universe. We've explored the fact that an atom is the smallest particle of, essentially, everything there is - including us. We look forward to culminating our space studies with a special lunch in September 5th. Following that, we will move into our study of oceans. We will also discuss other bodies of water, but will focus on the ocean biome, and the life it contains. We will study the parts of the fish. Resources, as always, are welcome.



In August, we also were fortunate to celebrate a birthday of one of our students with a birthday lunch. Snack treats are always welcome in addition to the birthday walk, and may be a group snack in the morn-



ing, or a dessert or accompaniment with lunch. This year, we ask that you plan a single birthday lunch per month during those months that we have student birthdays in our class, IF you would like to do so. (i.e., we prefer not to have multiple birthday lunches in any given month.) To that end, feel free to contact us regarding children in our class that share your child's birth month.

We look forward to receiving your volunteer questionnaires. We know that it is impossible for each of you to be present in our classroom, we certainly understand that. We are grateful to everyone who volunteers, whether that puts you in our midst, or whether that has you creating something for the classroom at home, or sending in food or supplies for an event. We truly appreciate you.

We have had our first fire drill of the school year - perhaps you heard about it if your child is new to our class. We do fire drills once a month. Formal severe weather drills are less frequent, but we will practice on our own if the forecast dictates that we should be prepared. We want your child to have as much information beforehand as possible, so as to minimize the possible fear factor. A couple of years ago, we did spend 1:19 on our closet, with students, both teachers, and

an adult volunteer. What we learned from that is that the students were prepared, and were fine. We also learned, however, that the girls with longer hair were very uncomfortable as a classmate's weight shifted onto their hair - which was on the floor - from time to tome (as they were in the storm position). To that end, I have kept a package of hair elastics in the closet solely for the purpose of gathering back the girls' hair, should we ever find ourselves in such a situation again.

In this environment, we are always learning. If we are lucky, we are always learning, wherever we are. Thank you for sharing your children with us for this portion of their 'formal' education. Let's enjoy the journey together. ~ Ms. Dagmar

Our next unit will be on the ocean. If you have any books or objects about the ocean, please send them in for your child to share


