Dolphin Tales

After the whirlwind of October, with its *many* exciting activities, we are settling into the month of November with renewed energy and an academic focus. We have many new lessons and concepts being presented in Math and Language, as well as continued in-depth lessons in the taxonomy of animal and plant kingdoms.

Additionally, we will continue our Socratic method of *shared inquiry* in Junior Great Books. The 4th years are particularly gaining fluency in this method, and are accurately generating multiple answers to interpretive questions, using textual evidence for each. In Writer's Workshop, all students are learning methods of research writing—with instruction in paraphrasing and summarizing, direct quotes, composing an outline, and rough drafts. Additionally, we are working on composing expository essays about the chapter books we have selected. This will go beyond the standard book report and involve

specific techniques for exposing the reader to new information.

Alongside our academic focus, we will be increasing our efforts in the *Frozen* production. With additional practice days and small group work during recess, we should be ready for this new performance.

For Thanksgiving, our class will have its annual pot-luck style Feast. Our students will be involved in preparing a number of side dishes and sweet treats, while the parents will be invited to sign up for traditional feast items (turkey, dressing, etc.). Families are welcome at this joyous lunch!

We look forward to this month of gratitude, and will continue challenging the students in all areas of the curriculum.

have been given and now the children are able to work and achieve mastery of the materials.




Elementary News: Ms. Dolores & Ms. Karla

Students drilled the woodboard walls to 4x4 posts, filled the box with compost and soil, and arranged, planted, and watered the flowers. classrooms. We will also soon begin a pilot program for composting. By the end of the school year, we hope to have recycled 1,000 pounds of materials. Students have embraced the aim to reduce, recycle, and reuse.
