




Primary News from Ms. Dagmar and Ms. Diane









Elementary News: Ms. Michelle and Ms. Stefanie



The beginning of a new school year is a very exciting time for both students and teachers. The children are eager to reunite with dear friends and favorite lessons/work. Teachers are passionate about being in the classroom again! This is my nineteenth year teaching yet it still feels as fresh and as new as that first year! This is one of the reasons I love to teach for each school year is its own wondrous unique journey. Our class story for the 2015-2016 school year has just begun! As we write each page together may we write it with love, laughter, and peace! For in the end these things will matter far more than just academics for it is the whole child in Montessori that we strive to nurture and grow!

Peace in our Community

The goal of a peaceful classroom environment is a standard for every Montessori school including ours. To achieve this we present the lessons of Grace and Courtesy at each stage of development. In Lower Elementary, these familiar lessons are presented again but now with a new twist. They are given as a small drama to the class in a role playing fashion. The students discuss what was done inappropriately in the role play and how it could have been done differently. We then acknowledge and practice the correct behavior. Lessons in this manner will be given throughout the school year but much emphasis is put on Grace and Courtesy now for it will help set the tone of our class.



There are some Grace and Courtesy lessons our group will pick up and utilize immediately while others may take time and constant repetition before new habits replace old ones. Currently we are working on using "walking feet" inside our classroom for example. Students consciously know the dangers of running inside as well as the distractions it causes. To run is an impulse and with constant attention and time given to helping children change this behavior it should occur less and less. This is just one example of many. Lessons on polite words, table manners, sharing, patience, kindness, forgiveness, etc are the work of being human. As I give these lessons to the children I admit to myself that I too need these reminders. This work is for all ages and for the benefit of all including our classroom, home, community, and world.


I am most inspired right now by the independent use of the Peace Table in our room. I have had mixed emotions about the Peace Table in Lower Elementary in the past for various reasons but decided this year to give it a try. I have used the Peace Rose with great success in previous environments but did not apply the formal use of a designated location to facilitate this process. I am absolutely thrilled by observations of how our students are empowered to solve their own disputes with kindness and respect by using the Peace Table and Peace Rose together. Learning how to communicate and solve differences is a lifelong skill which children can begin at an early age. How might our world change for the better if each generation has these lessons?

Thank you parents for all that you do in your homes to promote the best qualities in your children. We are blessed to have such a loving generous community at our school. Hats off to our devoted parents!

Elementary News: Ms. Dolores & Ms. Cheyenne



What a great year we are having so far...your children are practicing their grace and courtesy, settling into a routine, and becoming more and more independent every day. I'm really proud of the 2nd and 3rd year students for taking the time to help our new students (and Ms. Cheyenne) settle into the classroom.

We've explored the creation stories of several ancient civilizations and presented a more modern interpretation that follows more recent scientific theories. The door is now open for further discussion at home about your family's personal beliefs. We also spent several afternoons with hands-on experiments demonstrating the laws of nature (gravity, inertia, magnetism). Our Timeline of Life celebrates the plants and animals (current and extinct) from the most primitive to the most complex. Regular botany and zoology lessons will begin soon, along with a more in-depth study of the solar system and the dinosaurs.
